Niger	Husband's Schools to support Women's SRH	The School for Husbands strategy extends family planning programs to men rather than focusing only on women. This involvement of men is a catalyst for initiating their critical reflections on issues relating to reproduction and sexuality in both public and private spaces.	Open call	
Niger	Solidarity funding for obstetric transport	The program makes it possible to ensure medical emergency transport without households bearing the cost of such transport. The solidarity fund is set up by deducting 100 FCFA from all consultations in health centers. Nigeria	Gender Mainstreaming in Basic Health Care Provision Fund	Improving UHC, through strengthening health insurance and primary health care systems in Abia BHCPF Accredited facilities. Supported the pilot implementation of Task Shifting /Task Sharing (TS/TS) policy specifically in administering Long Active Reversible Contraceptive (LARC) in 6 LGAs.	Open call	
Togo	Female CHW training and deployment	The idea of giving women the opportunity to demonstrate with dignity what they are capable of was a key point in the success of the program. The patients of the program, namely women, feel more at ease when they find themselves in front of their female peers to have access to care. This state of affairs allows the program to be able to reap quite impactful results that demonstrate the importance of this gendered approach for improving MCH outcomes through community-based care.
